Monday night Nepean Sailing Club has Optimist racing and we encourage parents to be involved in taking interested children over there. We will set up the opportunity.



EASTER SEALS REPORT

The 2007 Easter Seals Regatta, a joint NSC and BYC fundraising event was held on Friday the 13 - that's tempting fate - and Saturday July 14, and although the weather wasn't perfect it allowed the sailing events to be held more or less without interruption.

The regatta started at BYC on Friday evening with live and silent auctions, both of which raised significant amounts of money. The live auction was good fun and friendly rivalry contributed to its success. Then two interlocking musical entertainment groups, the Fabulous Edsels and Polaris, kept us entertained whilst food was supplied steadily. The cheese trays and veggie trays were tasty, as to be expected; however, it's not stretching a point too far to use the word fabulous again to describe the bar-b-que'd beef, chicken and shrimp on skewers. Dancing followed the auctions and the evening went on longer than expected because everybody was having lots of fun. As with last year, your correspondent and his wife left for home whilst things were still going strong - us old folk can't keep up with the young 'uns.

Next day, in a different fashion to previous years, the on-water activities started with sponsored swimmers setting out at 8:00am from NSC to make the 2.9 kilometre journey to BYC. Unfortunately our reception for their arrival was a bit of a scramble because of late changes in the schedule. Complications at that point included disposing of a dead squirrel which had thoughtlessly expired right in front of

the main club entrance. Nevertheless, the first swimmer, Sasha Veyette from Montreal covered the course in an impressive 47 minutes 58 seconds. All those who set out, about eight people, completed the course. At least one swimmer said he hoped the swim would be repeated because they don't get enough of that sort of open-water practice to keep in shape for actual competitive events.

Next on the agenda was the Sailpast, with Black Jack as the central vessel taking the salute. Weather conditions at this point were just about perfect; sunny but not too warm, with gentle breezes. The participating vessels, including Black Jack, took on board about 25 Easter Seals families. However, because fewer vessels than expected turned up and because Black Jack was not going to be available in the afternoon, it took seven families to the Sailpast, rather than the four it was planned to carry. Graciously, our Commodore and his partner, Lynn, took Firefly to the salute with some guests, so that there would be more room for the Easter Seals children on Black Jack. The communications between the fleet at NSC and Black Jack at BYC, resulting from last minute reorganizations caused a few headaches, made worse by a number of factors, for example a dying cell phone battery. A nice touch was the genuine pirate aboard Black Jack who thoroughly entertained the passengers.

While all this was going on there were children's activities at NSC with such things as face painting, reptiles and clowns. Lunch was provided at NSC as preparations were being made for the Rally. The weather deteriorated in the afternoon with gusty winds and drenching rain showers; however, all the rally starters completed the course. Although 39 boats registered, only 15 actually raced, probably because of the poor weather. Aon Fior was the overall winner of the Easter Seals trophy, after successfully purchasing a better time, and Makai 27 won the best-dressed boat award. While the rally results were being worked out

Black Jack's pirate had his head and beard shaved, adding quite a bit more money to the collection.

A tasty and relatively quiet dinner was served at NSC as the excitement was dying down. But the lull was short-lived and the pace picked up again with the start of live music, which was obviously going to lead into a lively evening. As is becoming a bit of a habit, your correspondent once again slipped out at this point.

To summarize, a handsome fleet of NSC and BYC boats were volunteered for the Regatta, a

large number of Easter Seals families were entertained and, at the time of writing over \$54,000 has been raised. Countless volunteers worked hard to make the event a resounding success, and numerous sponsors gave freely to the cause. Last of all, a heartfelt thank you goes out to everybody who contributed their efforts to the event.
